Emanuel,

We have some great news to share. Mark and Marcia Melanson recently sold the historic Swanson family home on Read Avenue. Most recently Mabel (Swanson) Lewis lived there. After the sale of the home, Mark and Marcia have generously offered to give \$80,000 towards the solar panel project at Emanuel. This will cover almost all the costs of the project.

We will have a special congregational meeting to take a formal vote on this project. The meeting will be at Emanuel on Sunday November 17, 2024 in Emanuel's sanctuary. You are cordially invited to attend.

A congregational vote is required when spending more than 5% of the annual budget. The cost of the solar panels and their installation will be

 \sim \$81,000. Plus the removal of a tree that would cost of \sim \$2,800. The total project cost would be \sim \$83,800.

The solar panels are expected to cover close to 100% of Emanuel's and Joyful Noise's electric needs. In 2023 the electric bill for the building (Emanuel and Joyful Noise) was ~\$10,000. Joyful Noise paid for over 70% of this bill. Most of the year Joyful pays for 70% of the bill. During the summer they pay 80%.

The panels would be installed in 2025. Emanuel would receive a rebate from the government in 2026 of ~\$32,000.

Total Project Cost	- ~\$83,800
+ donation	\$80,000
+ rebate	~\$32,000
positive gain after rebate	~\$28,200

After the rebate Emanuel would be ahead \$28,200. These funds could be used for other ministry needs or projects.

Additionally, Joyful Noise would continue to pay for 70% of the building's electrical usage at the going rate the RI Electric is charging. This would be an ongoing income source for Emanuel.

Emanuel's council with help from the Property and Finance committees has researched this project and prayerfully considered it. Especially given the generous donation, we support moving forward with the project and believe it will be good for the church, good for the environment, and we believe it is what God is calling us to do.



Bible Study on Wednesdays on the book of Genesis




Next session this Wednesday November 20th at 7PM in-person at Emanuel

Bible Readings for Sunday November 17th

First Reading Isaiah 6:1-8

Isaiah sees a vision of the Lord in the temple. Isaiah sees himself as unworthy, but his sin is forgiven, and when the Lord asks whom shall we send, Isaiah speaks up and says, "Here I am. Send me."

¹In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. ²Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. ³And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory."

⁴The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. ⁵And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts!"

⁶Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. ⁷The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." ⁸Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?"

Isaiah is asked to deliver a hard message to the people of Judah. They will soon be conquered and their cities laid to waste by the Babylonians.

'Keep listening, but do not comprehend;

keep looking, but do not understand.'

and listen with their ears,

and comprehend with their minds,

and turn and be healed."

11Then I said, "How long, O Lord?" And he said:

"Until cities lie waste

without inhabitant,

and houses without people,

and the land is utterly desolate;

12until the LORD sends everyone far away,

and vast is the emptiness in the midst of the land.


13Even if a tenth part remain in it,

Upcoming Commemorations

Elizabeth of Hungary, renewer of society, died 1231 Sunday, November 17, 2024

Born in Hungary, Elizabeth was betrothed to the son of the Landgrave of Thuringia, and at age four was taken to be raised with him at the Wartburg Castle. Ten years later they were married. She was very generous to the poor, and after her husband's death she lived in cruel hardship until her own death at age twenty-four.

Clement, Bishop of Rome, died around 100 Saturday, November 23, 2024

Clement was the third bishop of Rome. He is best remembered for a letter he wrote to the congregation in Corinth, still struggling with the same problems that led to Paul's letters to them. As did Paul, he focused on the need for love among Christians.

Miguel Agustín Pro, martyr, died 1927 Saturday, November 23, 2024

Pro grew up in a time when the Mexican revolutionaries accused the church of siding with the wealthy. He became a Jesuit priest, and worked on behalf of the poor and homeless. Falsely accused of throwing a bomb at a government official, he was executed, but not before crying out "Long live Christ the King!"
